


Roles within reporting 1



The roles within reporting can be split into the following categories.



Sharing information

ANALYSING

Discuss what these roles are and think about which ones may suit you and your peers best



Identify your group roles



How do you as a group decide who takes what role?

- As a group, produce a short news presentation on your chosen topic.

SOCIAL MEDIA - #HASHTAGS - BLOGGING - YOUTUBE


Discuss and expand on each method with the group. What other methods can you think of?

Task - compare the post...

In pairs, research each of the methods above, and discuss the differences between them.

E.g. this could be the length of a social media post, the use of hashtags etc.

Use tablets or iPads to research the methods and write answers in pairs. Discuss the findings with the whole group, and using a flipchart note the group's findings.



Facebook statistics (2018)

- 2.23 billion monthly active users
- 1.47 billion daily active users
- Five new profiles are created every second
- Average time spent per Facebook visit is 20 minutes
- Appprox £50billion advertising revenue in last 12 months






Instagram statistics (2018)

- 1 billion monthly active users
- 500 million daily active users
- 73% of young people who are internet users have used Instagram
- Over 40 billion photos shared





Twitter statistics (2018)

- 330 million monthly active users
- 100 million daily active users
- 500 million tweets are sent every day!
- Appprox \$545 million advertising revenue in last 12 months

Traditional media

Before social media and smart-phones, traditional media would include video (and TV), radio and the internet.

Skills required to tell a story using traditional media include:

Making / editing / uploading images

(this could be photography or graphics / drawings / illustrations

- Recording / editing / uploading audio
- · Recording / editing / uploading video
- 'Copywriting' (writing text / a script)


- Discuss internet safety with the group.

Peer education

What is peer education?

Ask your peers to do some research about peer education.

Once they have done this, as a group form a sentence which would help explain peer education to somebody else.

Pre-project planning 1





Analysing

Examine something in detail, typically in order to explain and interpret it

Assign

Allocate a job or duty

Circumstances

A fact or condition connected with or relevant to an event or action. Someone's state of financial, material or personal welfare

Expand

Become or make larger or more extensive

Reflect

Think deeply or carefully about

Reporting

Give a spoken or written account of something that one has observed, heard, done, or investigated

Research

The systematic investigation into and study of materials and sources in order to establish facts and reach new conclusions

Resilience

The capacity to recover quickly from difficulties; toughness

Techniques

A skilful or efficient way of doing or achieving something

Storyboard

A sequence of drawings, typically with some directions and dialogue, representing the shots planned for a film or television production
